

Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent



Nature Notes

Having been away for most of the past month, there are only a few personal observations that have been made since last writing. My friend in Pebmarsh has now seen her turtle doves and she sent me tantalising snaps of them perched on her garden fence. Unfortunately, my three visits to find them have all ended in disappointment but I will keep on trying.

There was a bonus on my last visit when I spotted a pair of Egyptian geese descending into a field of barley. This is a new 'tick' for my patch list, so

quite exciting. They are birds found throughout sub-Saharan Africa and have been introduced to Britain, where they are now established in East Anglia, although not common. Since first breeding in Essex in the 70's, they have gradually increased but remain sporadic. A touch of the exotic.



My friend is doubly lucky as she has just sent me pictures of a couple of bee orchids she found in one of her fields. When I get to see it, this will be another first for the local patch for me. They are not common but do occur in Essex, including on several Essex Wildlife Trust reserves. They are mimics – the lower velvety lip looks like a female bumble bee and males attempting to mate with it pollinate the plant. A mind-boggling evolutionary achievement!



Fields in Pebmarsh have good numbers of swallows and house martins hawking insects above them but other areas seem puzzlingly empty. So far, I have not seen a swift on the local patch although Castle Hedingham usually has a small flock in residence. As usual, as the summer reaches its hottest, bird interest wanes and attention moves elsewhere. Butterflies and moths become the focus and sorting the moth trap can take a full day. The

first moth out of the trap last night was a new species for the garden – a Green Oak Tortrix. This micro is one of the easiest to identify, being a delicate green with the leading edge of the wing narrowly bordered in yellow and the cilia whitish. It was followed shortly after by another first – Poplar Kitten, a white furry-looking macro with black spots and a grey band, aptly named.



A final word for the birds; the garden is full of newly-fledged juvenile blue and great tits, sparrows and starlings. They line up to be fed and the adults oblige, working tirelessly to keep them satisfied. Demanding youngsters and stressed parents, not unlike human families.





The 1000-Mile Cycle Challenge

The Great Maplestead Community Field Project, an ambitious plan to replace the ageing playground equipment and make the field more accessible and inclusive to people of all ages and abilities, was launched in 2021.

Aiming to give a significant boost to our fundraising activities, we hatched the idea of doing a sponsored challenge nicknamed LeJoG – Land's End to John O'Groats – a cycle ride from the most southwesterly corner of England to the most northeasterly tip of Scotland.



There's no fixed route for LeJoG – the distance can be as little as 850 miles or as much as a 1000 miles. As we really wanted to challenge ourselves, we planned a 1000 mile route to be completed in 14 straight days of cycling.

We set off from Land's End on 15th May into a strong headwind en route to Fowey, wondering what the next two weeks would bring. We soon found out – hills, lots of very steep hills and weather, lots of cold, wet weather! We

arrived in Fowey exhausted and drenched, just a taster of what would lie ahead of us!

And what lay ahead was indeed a huge challenge, but one that turned out to be one of the most extraordinary experiences of our lives.

Every day was completely different: the near vertical climbs up from Polruan Harbour and the King Harry ferry; the fast sweeping switchbacks into Tintern and Monmouth; the stark beauty and empty roads of the Forest of Bowland; the horrible drag from Carlisle to Glasgow, with bikes feeling that they would rattle apart and we would be sucked under the next logging lorry that flew past; the calm, flat ride along Loch Lomond in the morning, followed by the hurtle into Glencoe through driving sleet in the afternoon;

the never ending drag uphill into a headwind to the Crask Inn; the glorious spin down to the golden beaches of Bettyhill; the euphoria and near hypothermia at John O'Groats. What an adventure and what a test of bodies, emotions and machines – indeed a once-in-a-lifetime experience!

We would not have achieved this without our support team and roving bloggers, Julie and Ann, who were always there on the side of the road with cups of hot coffee and jelly babies in our hours of need – of which there were many!

And finally, just as important to our success were our campaign supporters, whose generous donations and messages of encouragement throughout the ride motivated us when our energy and spirits flagged.

We made it! And, most importantly, we exceeded our funding target of £5000!

Gardening Corner

A slight change to my normal article this month – instead of a plant I am going to recommend a garden of the month. In fact, four gardens – one from each nation in the UK.

Firstly, a garden close to home: **Fullers Mill, West Stow** just north of Bury. St. Edmunds. Created by the late Bernard Tickner and passed to Perennial (formerly the Gardeners Benevolent Society), this beautiful garden sits of the edge of the River Lark and Culford Brook. Running water is a feature and the garden is well maintained by a dedicated staff. There are always interesting and unusual plants for sale.

Secondly: **Aberglasney Gardens, Carmathenshire.** The Elizabethan origins of this garden are evident from entering the Cloister and there are over 10 acres to walk around, with individual areas. Since my visit to the garden the house has also been opened to the public. I well remember the wonderful show of blue Mecanopsis poppies in this superb location.

Next: Castle Kennedy Gardens, Stranraer. These stunning gardens have a strong connection with WW2. They sit on the Gulf Stream and have a number of walks, some of which are bordered by



rhododendrons influenced by Sir Joseph Hooker. Situated adjacent to a loch, and in a costal location, there are herbaceous borders and magnificent spring displays of bulbs and magnolias. Garden walks can be booked in advance.

Lastly: **Bangor Castle, Northern Ireland**. I have not been to this attractive walled garden but I gather there is an impressive central fountain. Open from April to November, there are hooped walkways and the garden maintains its 1840's feel. An eclectic mixture of plants, box hedging and cordon fruit trees, the garden is described by visitors as an oasis of seclusion and calm. The café/tea shop is not to be missed, I am told.

If you visit open gardens this summer there is nearly always a plant to see that you are not familiar with, or a design that can inspire you.

Remember to check opening times and dates!



Coconut Slice

This recipe was always made by my baby-sitter for my birthday. I now continue the tradition by making it for my son's and his cousins' birthdays. So next time you're having a party, why not try it!

4oz (110g) plain chocolate 2oz (55g) glace cherries -

2oz (55g) margarine chopped

4oz (110g) desiccated coconut 7in (18cm) square shallow tin -

4oz (110g) sugar lined

1 egg – beaten

Method:

Preheat the oven to 320oF/180oC

Melt the chocolate and pour it into the lined tin; allow to set

In a saucepan, melt the margarine then stir in the sugar, coconut and chopped cherries. Then add the beaten egg and mix well.

Spread the mixture over the chocolate and bake for 20mins until golden brown.

Hedgerow Jelly

A mixed harvest of autumn hedgerow fruits in this tangy jelly that can be preserved and enjoyed.

1lb (450g) blackberries

1lb (450g) elderberries

1lb (450g) crab apples

8oz (225g) sloes

Water

Granulated sugar

Prepare the fruit by washing it all and cutting

up the crab apples roughly. An easy way to remove the elderberries from the stems is to pull them through the prongs of a fork.

Place the fruit into a thick-based pan and just cover with water. Simmer slowly until all the fruit is very mushy. Strain through a jelly bag – do not squeeze the bag or the jelly will be cloudy – and then leave overnight.

Measure the juice and place in a clean, thick-based pan. Add 1lb (450g) of granulated sugar for each pint of juice extract. Stir over a gentle heat until all the sugar has dissolved and then boil rapidly until the setting point is reached (220°F/120°C on a sugar thermometer or test for setting on a cold plate, when the jelly wrinkles).

Pour into clean, warm jam jars and cover and seal in the usual way.
