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Letter from the Reverend Beverley Vincent

By the time you receive this magazine we will just be entering the Christian season of Lent, commencing with Ash Wednesday on 2nd March. Lent is a strange kind of time and it seems that fewer people today are familiar with the traditional meaning and purpose of Lent. Many of us will probably be discussing what we might be giving up for Lent, anything from chocolate to wine, caffeine, sugar etc; I confess I don't think I could give up chocolate for the forty days of Lent!

However, historically Lent was indeed the time when Christians fasted and gave up something that they enjoyed, but the purpose was to help them focus and prepare for the coming of Holy Week, to remember the death of Jesus on the Cross and then to prepare to celebrate Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday. Today many Christians still use this season of Lent as a time of reflection and preparation.

As I sit and write this in the midst of storm Eunice, with the wind battering my windows, I can't help reflecting on the storms of life we all face. This Sunday's Bible reading is Jesus calming the storm (Luke 8:22-25), who said God doesn't have a sense of humour! When we feel tossed about and battered by circumstances, we are assured of God's love and his presence with us in those difficult times. Remember the words of psalm 23 'though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, you are with me, your rod and your staff they comfort me'. How easy it is to forget that the Lord is with us in the dark places.

Flat fare £2.50 single, £4 return between any two stages. Concessionary bus passes are accepted after 0900 Monday to Friday and all day on Saturdays.



The Power Cut

This power cut has been a reminder of what a lovely neighbourhood we live in. For us residents in Cock Road we had one neighbour with a generator and they took the time to deliver hot flasks of water to any neighbours that needed it. Other people offered camping stoves and generally we all looked after each other so big thanks to people in Cock Road for their community spirit. It was much appreciated.

Nature Notes

Last month I bemoaned the paucity of migrant thrushes, but no sooner had the ink dried they were suddenly everywhere. Big mixed flocks with fieldfares outnumbering redwings in fields around the village. There was even a redwing that graced my garden and made it onto the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch list.

An unusual bird to be seen in winter is the blackcap warbler. These used to be summer visitors,



arriving in spring from southern Europe and North Africa to breed here before leaving in autumn. In recent years, probably as a result of milder winters, some birds have remained and one of these appeared in my garden at the end of January. It was a male, easily recognised by the black cap that gives its name to the species. The female has a rusty brown cap. During the breeding season they are almost entirely insectivorous but overwintering birds are forced to diversify and they will take a variety of fruits and berries. There are records of them taking peanuts from feeders, but I was surprised to see my bird taking whole sunflower hearts and swallowing them. I counted 11 at one go; even the finches crack the hearts to get the kernel and drop the outer covering.

I noticed a display by goldfinches recently that I hadn't previously observed, although I'm sure it is quite common. They always arrive in a small flock and need to queue to access one of the four perches on the feeder in order to get at the sunflower hearts that are the only food they will eat of the variety I have on offer. The display involves dropping the wings slightly while perched and wagging the spread tail from side to side. Looking this up, I read it is called the pivoting display and is a threat procedure. So it seems they are not queueing in an orderly British fashion – rather, they pose and posture to establish some sort of hierarchy that will allow more dominant individuals to get quicker access. I am constantly surprised by the intricacy of the tiny lives outside my window.

Aren't the grey squirrels a pest! Like jays, they hoard food in the autumn and during winter they relocate it as required. I'm not sure their memories are all that good, as they have been digging holes all over my lawn to recover their bounty and it is quite a mess. I'm almost (but not quite) looking forward to the grass growing and having to mow, as that will tidy it up again.

Gardening Corner

At last! Days are becoming longer and the bulbs mentioned last month are flowering, giving a hint of spring.

I came across an article recently regarding Peonies. A colourful perennial, these can be propagated by cutting away a section of the crown, using a sharp spade, and taking a wedge with 2 or 3 buds protruding and some root growth at the base. Plant the wedge in a welldrained location, incorporating some compost in the planting hole. Do not plant too deeply – water well to start with and cover the buds with fleece or a little soil if a severe frost is forecast.



Now is the time to nip the tops out of sweet pea seedlings; this will encourage the young plants to bush out and make a studier specimen.

This month's recommended plant is Bergenia (sometimes known as Elephants Ears). It makes an ideal plant for a shady location and will flower from early spring onwards. There are numerous colour variants, from white and pinks through to purple; the leaf also looks quite attractive. It is a good companion plant with Myosotis (Forget-me-not) in the early part of the year. Bergenia grows on a rhizome and it can be divided periodically. Cut a 3" section and pot on until the young plant is showing leaf growth then plant out in a flower border ready for the following year.

Snowdrops can be lifted and divided now, while they are 'in the green'. Thin out the bulbs and replant in groups of three, five or seven.

Another job for this time of year is putting up training wires on walls and fences. As climbers grow, they benefit from support and tying in.

The Victorians were great lovers of the herbaceous border and they often placed paving stones at the back of a border to make it easier for weeding and to stop soil compaction. I randomly place a paving stone or slab in a border or bed; these can become a feature and provide something to stand on when you cannot work from the path or lawn.

Lawns can be edged with an iron or a spade. Try and keep to the existing shape of the flower bed otherwise the lawn becomes smaller and the bed larger.

Lastly, there are a good range of seeds available from numerous outlets; the varieties for sale provide plenty of choice.

National Grid Proposals

National Grid are proposing to reinforce the electrical power distribution network between Bramford and Twinstead.

Whilst Gestingthorpe Parish Council fully understand why reinforcement is necessary, to bring green energy to the region, they consider that National Grid's current proposals do not fully consider their effect on the environment and local villages. The main concern is the extremely large substation which could be constructed at Butlers Wood, close to the A131 between Twinstead and Gestingthorpe. As currently proposed the the substation would have a considerable impact on the beautiful landscape around the village. There are alternative sites for the substation that would have far less impact but National Grid have not yet put these forward in their proposals. There is currently a consultation on the proposals which ends on 21st March. If anyone wishes to have their say and have some influence on the scheme they can obtain the proposal documents from nationalgrid.com/bramford-twinstead or by phoning 0808 196 1515."





This is the final part of our series of articles designed to help you manage your online activity safely and minimise your digital footprint:

- 13. Make a plan for if you lose your device: have you backed up everything that's important in case the originals are lost or damaged? Do you have secure copies of your contact information, apps and device configurations? It is worth considering various back-up solutions, from paper-based to cloud-based services (but watch your digital footprint with the latter!) and even configuring your device for remote wiping.
- 14. **Don't make your device easy for others to access**: consider using different passwords for all your devices and always secure your voicemail with a PIN code. Make sure to change passwords and PINs from their default settings. This will help defend against unauthorised access (including remote access to your voicemail).

Protect your device from malware as much as you can. Malware is malicious software that exists in forms, such as:

- **Spyware** gathers personal information to pass on to criminals.
- Viruses shuts down entire system, can spread to other machines.
- Ransomware restricts access to your computer, demands a fee to unlock.

Useful tips to help keep your device safe from malware include:

- Use appropriate antivirus software it scans websites, incoming e-mails and files you open for known viruses. But it's important you keep this software regularly updated.
- Make sure firewalls on your devices are turned on.
- Ensure your device's operating system (OS) and apps are kept up to date set your OS to automatically check for software updates when connected to the internet. Install updates as soon as you get a reminder.
- Avoid using public WiFi as much as possible not all public WiFi is encrypted, even if you are asked to enter a password. If you need to use public WiFi, try to send or receive private information from a secure web page and use only well-known, commercial hotspot providers.
- Be mindful of those around you when using the internet in public places

 don't make it easy for others to see your password or personal
 information. Treat this information like it's your bank card PIN.

We hope these series of articles have been useful in helping to improve your awareness and make you appreciate the vigilance you need in order to minimise your digital footprint and reduce online risks.

It has been a success - lots of running and playing and snuggling up together. Wilf seems to love the company, and Bert loves him.

There's no doubt dogs, like children, have very different personalities - Stan didn't want to play with a ball, or with another dog - he loved his life with his human family as it was before it changed...there are definitely people like that.

Double Cooked Beef, Wine and Paprika Casserole.

A classic French boeuf bourguignon recipe, this serves 6-8 people, or two for three days depending on portion control! Best done in a 4.1 litre castiron casserole; use a wok/very large frying pan until the oven stage if using an earthenware casserole. **Do not use a slow cooker!**

800g diced braising steak 1x red pepper, cored and sliced into strips

1x large or 2x medium RED onions 1/2 pack dried porcini mushrooms 200g de-stalked button mushrooms 1x tbs paprika (not hot or smoked) 250g frozen soffritto mix 1x can chopped tomatoes 2-3 cloves garlic peeled and crushed 6x shallots peeled Approx. 9x tbs plain flour Light olive oil

Bottle of supermarket Italian red a sunny wine for a Mediterranean recipe!

While pre-heating the oven to 185-190oC, put the porcini mushrooms in a mug, fill with just-off-the-boil water and cover. Put the flour into a bowl and season with salt and pepper.

With the casserole/wok/frying pan on the hottest hob, coat with light olive oil (this can withstand the very high cooking temperature). Roll the beef pieces in flour, dust and then roll them across the pan until completely seared; add more oil as needed. Put the browned meat into an empty bowl. Don't worry about burnt bits sticking to the pan – see later! When all the meat is browned, reduce the hob to medium. Put the bowl of flour aside.

Toss the onions, crushed garlic and some more oil into the pan. Using a wooden spatula, stir and cook until the onions just go soft – this also loosens the stuck burnt bits! Introduce the meat and juices, all the tomatoes and the whole bottle of wine. Add the porcini mushrooms, their water, the peppers and the frozen soffritto – don't defrost, just let it melt in. Turning the hob back to maximum, add the shallots and button mushrooms.

As the mixture comes up to simmer, add some paprika and the flour and stir thoroughly. It's now ready for the oven. If using a wok/frying pan, put everything into the earthenware casserole. It will be almost full, so use an oven drip tray.

Cook for 1 hour, turn off the heat and leave in the oven for 24 hours – don't take it out or put it in the fridge! Then thoroughly stir, add paprika to taste, and re-cook at 185-190oC for another hour.

It's now ready to serve with mash, rice or pasta. If it's a supper dish, enjoy with fine French beans. If serving over several days, leave in the oven for another 24 hours, then heat through for about 30 minutes. The second day it will taste even better – the sauce will be a rich dark colour! After this serving, decant the remainder into a container; keep in the fridge or freeze for later. Nothing is burglar or crime proof, if someone is that determined to break in or steal, they will do so despite the security in place. But there is no reason to get paranoid about security, it is all about having the right risk commensurate measures in place i.e., security measures appropriate to the crime risk. You live in an average house with average contents then there is not the need to have the same level of security as that is needed for a mansion, naturally the mansion or property with high value contents will need a higher level of security. For instance, you would be fool to protect a $\pounds 12,000$ cycle with just a lock costing just a few pounds, the security measures of anything must be relative to the value of the item and the risk. It's all about making your property less attractive to the thief, is it too difficult to steal, is the thief more likely to be arrested, is the desirability/ value of the property not obvious or is the property identifiable, these are just a few of the considerations a thief may have in choosing a target. You will need to consider the requirements of your insurance company for whatever you intend covering, if it is an expensive item or of heritage value it is wise to have discussions with your insurer or insurance agent to ensure that you have correct level of cover in place and understand any additional protection that they may require.

Now you may remember that Aviva Insurance advert containing the interrogation and the words "...does your door lock conform to British Standard 3621..." reply "I don't know, nobody knows" https:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=2PTtGHaftGM . This relates to product certification such as LPS1175 general security, and PAS24 window and door-sets which are a measure that it has passed independent security testing. Another and easier way to find a tested security product is to look for the logos or webpages of Secured by Design www.securedbydesign.com or Sold Secure www.soldsecure.com accredited products which as part of the accreditation process have to have the relevant certification.

Personal recommendation of a family member, friend or colleague when choosing a trader provides some assurance or with services and traders Essex Trading Standards have a totally independent accreditation scheme called 'Buy with Confidence' https://www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk/find-a-business/ . There are also a number of trade bodies such as for: Locksmiths – The Master Locksmith Association https://www.locksmiths.co.uk/ and intruder alarms and CCTV - NSI www.nsi.org.uk or SSAIB https://ssaib.org/ their membership providing some confidence in products and services .

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
