My thoughts this month have been turning towards 'hope'. Life can be tough at times, and never more so than now, especially as we are wearied from 2 years of Covid and now the ongoing situation in Ukraine and the worry of the rising cost of living uppermost in our minds. Hope is a much-needed commodity in society, whether we are thinking nationally, internationally, or more in terms of our local community.

We have just celebrated Easter Sunday, the source of Christian hope. It signifies the first occasion in the story of the Christian faith, when all seemed to be bleak, all was lost, hope was gone. 



Nature Notes

Winter had a last gasp resurgence at the end of March and into April with smatterings of snow, feather-light hail and a spell of crisp frosts. Redwings seemed to linger and a flock of 50 in Pebmarsh on the 27th of March was the last significant sighting. By then the verges were glistening white with stitchwort and dog's mercury was painting them green.

This cold snap did little to deter the enthusiasm of the local birdlife as more and more of them joined the dawn chorus and nesting activity became obvious.



Crows carrying sticks for nesting platforms, tits prospecting holes and crevices for nest-sites and the pheasants chasing each other around the garden. The males, in particular, are endlessly crowing and wing-flapping while squaring up to opponents.

I have a small pond in my garden and it has been something of a disappointment over the years, with little sign of occupation. A lone frog one year and the surface thick with floating pondweed. I decided to relieve it of an accumulation of dead leaves and using a small net started hauling them out and piling them up at the edge. I figured that any critters that had inadvertently been caught would make their way back into the water, and there certainly were numbers of small creeping things that I could see.

My grandson was curious, so I turned the pile over and spotted a movement; it was a smooth newt, complete with bright orange belly covered in black spots. Further dredging produced three more and I decided to halt the operation and let things be. Newts are largely terrestrial and on land they have a leathery skin. They move into water to breed, at which time the skin becomes smooth, and the bright colours appear. The young, known as efts, develop and leave the water to seek out damp, vegetated areas where they live until it is time to breed again. I will leave any further pond interference until the autumn in future.

With the advent of warm sunny days in mid-April the butterfly counts have increased and there are now six species visiting the garden. The brimstones and commas of March have been joined by small tortoiseshell, peacock, small white and (since yesterday) orange tips.

The moth trap has been disappointing however, with low numbers and few species. Despite this there were two new species for the garden, a small 'macro' (Least Black Arches), and a large 'micro', unflatteringly called the Brindled Flat-body. The terms micro and macro are somewhat arbitrary, with the various families assigned to one of the other; individual members of families often buck their assignation. In general the micros vastly outnumber the macros but are more difficult to identify. **Patch Patroller**



Gardening Corner

April certainly came in like a lion – what a surprise to see a covering of snow first thing in the morning. May on the other hand is when everything in the garden suddenly starts to grow and it's a case of what to do first!

This month's recommendation is Geum, a small hardy perennial with a number of colour variants from red to orange through to pale yellow. An



ideal plant for the front of a border or rockery.

I have to say the flowering prunus [cherry] have been magnificent this year – now is the time to note down the name of a variant that appeals to you ready for purchasing in the autumn.

Agapanthus can also be divided this month, using a sharp spade as described in this column previously.

In the vegetable garden now is the time to harden off tomato plants for external planting and potting up for the greenhouse. Do not plant out though until the risk of frost is over! Potatoes should be earthed up to protect the crown and the developing 'spuds'. Runner bean canes can be erected – I tend to do this to avoid running out of room in the vegetable garden. Continue to sow radish, carrots, beetroot and a later sowing of broad beans.

Feed container-grown shrubs and fruit trees with a granular feed, to sustain the former during the summer months and to improve fruiting yields for the latter.

Continue to move a hoe through the flower borders and vegetable rows – as I said earlier everything grows in May, especially the weeds!

Dahlia tubers can be planted out; they should be sending up new shoots so pot them up if necessary and place them in a warm environment. This will hasten the production of healthy stems.

Lawn mowing is a constant and the blades can now be lowered on the mower. Avoid scalping the grass as this encourages moss and bald patches.

Lastly, take the time to sit and admire your garden and all the hard work you have put into it this spring.



Jamaican Crunch Pie

4oz (112g) Gingernuts ¼ pint (0.14l) double cream 6 tbsps lemon juice Grated rind of 1 lemon 2oz (56g) Digestive biscuits 1 can sweetened condensed milk [approx 7oz (195g)] Glazed slices of lemon for decoration

Crush the Gingernuts and Digestive biscuits with a rolling pin, or a few at a time in an electric blender, and place in a bowl. Stir into melted butter.

Use the biscuit mixture to line a $7\frac{1}{2}$ inch (19cm) flan ring on a flat plate or board. Work the crumbs with the back of a metal spoon to form a shell; the edge should appear just above the flan ring.

Lightly whip the cream and fold in the condensed milk, lemon juice and rind and beat until smooth. Pour into the biscuit shell and chill overnight.

To make the glazed lemon slices:

In a shallow pan poach until tender 8 lemon slices (free of pips) in enough water to cover them. Keep the water level up. Drain the slices and add 3oz (84g) of sugar to the pan and, when dissolved, bring it to boil to reduce it to a glaze.

Pour the glaze over the slices and allow to cool. Then arrange on top of the pie.

Serves 6. (Delicious!)

Spring Garden Crime Prevention

Hopefully by the time that you read this Spring will be established with the weather improving, inviting us out into our gardens. It is a good time to take a look around; are your fences and gates in good condition do you have good quality locks on gates, will they keep the unwelcome intruder out? To the front of your property where possible keep fencing, planting, and hedges to about 1.2m in height so that an intruder is not hidden from view. Protect your rear garden with 1.8m strong fencing, close boarded wooden fencing, and gates are a good choice and this can be topped with trellis or a plastic spiky topping such as www.defendastrip.com/ (warning signs needed). Panels should not be able to be lifted out of the posts, and avoid your fencing becoming a ladder by ensuring that the horizontal cross battens are facing into your garden.

Security does not have to be just about locks, bolts, and spiky fence toppings; nature provides some excellent plants to keep people away. There are a number of attractive, fragrant plants of a spiky nature such as climbing roses, pyracantha and berberis and other planting of a dense nature that can work quite well. Have a chat at your garden centre or with the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) for the right plant.

Working in the garden: It is easy to get engrossed in what you are doing when working in the garden, if the house is empty it is wise to close and lock the door (don't forget the key though!). Remember when you stop for a break put your tools away, and at the end of the day as well as putting tools away put the wheelbarrow and wheelie bin away too. "It will add insult to injury" if your tools are used to break into your house, a neighbour's, nearby building such as a church, or provide a climbing aid or method of carrying things away.

New tools and lawn mowers: Be mindful of how you dispose of the packaging to your new purchases; don't advertise it to the thieves and burglars with your empty boxes on display outside for roadside collection. Fold boxes inside out or break them up and put them in bag for collection. If you are not using your lawn mower, jet washer or other put it away out of sight from prying eyes.

Property marking: It may deter a thief if your property or flower pots is visibly security marked with your house number and post code such as www.creproducts.co.uk or labelled if a forensic (hidden) property marking system is used such as www.smartwater.com or www.selectadna.co.uk. You can also record the serial numbers of any tools at www.immobilise.com/ . If your property does get stolen with property marking and/or recording, there is a greater chance of you getting it back.
